Martin is a 10 year old neutered cat that is not declawed and was owned for the past 8 years by the owner. She found him originally as a stray when she was living in Brazil and he has only lived with her since. Owner did state that Martin did not have nay kind of previous injuries but has had a history with medical issues. He has been prone to urinary infections but not for a few years now but does get constipated and needs to be monitored.

Martin has never been around children, othe roats, or dogs so his behavior with them is unknown. He is liter box trained and has been kept only indoors ever since she got him. Owner stated that he has a medium elvel of energy where he would lay around most of the time but get spurts of energy where he wants to play and run around. She described him as confident, friendly, talkative, and affectionate.

Behavior:

Martin has never bitten or scratched anyone or any other animal before.

Owner has never given the cat a bath or clipped his nails personally but has taken to a groomer. He will cry loudly when given a bath but will (with minimum struggle) allow them to bath him and clip his nails. He can cry loudly. He is not bothered and enjoys being picked up and held, s afraid of bei one who does it and is not bothered when woken up from sleep.

New Family Info:

Martin is used to clumping litter in an uncovered litter box. He does not really pla caps or paper balls. Owner stated he does not scratch on anything or use a scral every now and then jump up into your lap. When he plays with the owner it is gentl He is used to dry food but owner stated he is not particular to any one brand and

Max is a super sweet, smart, handsome young dog with a lot of energy. He loves to spend time with his people, play, exercise, and learn new tricks. He is very intelligent and a quick learner. He enjoys training classes and playing with other puppies. He loves learning and performing tricks. His favorites are give paw and give kisses.

Max is used to going on slow walks on the leash with an elderly man and was too difficult for him to control. He is also used to going running/jogging with his owner, which he loves.

Max loves to play including playing fetch, tag, and tug, and wrestling. His favorite toys are balls, stuffed animals, and squeaky toys.

Maximus loves to be with his people and followed his owner around the house constantly, always wanting to be in the same room as them. When he is alone he misses his family and barks/whines, and destroys furniture (walls, bed, etc.). He was crate trained when he was younger and this could probably be used to modify his behavior while he was home alone, along with regular mental and physical stimulation.

Max enjoys being brushed and is unbothered by having his food touched while eating, taking bones/rawhides/treats/toys away, pushing off of the furniture, holding or restraining, and disturbing while sleeping/resting. He barks at strangers approaching the house but doesn't growl, snap or bite.

Client came in saying that she had no choice but to give up her pomeranian because her lanlord said it's in violation of her lease. I asked her for how long she had the dog. She stated she had the dog in the apartment for a whole year before the lanlord said anything about this. She also stated that she would be allowed to keep the dog if she took on a rent raise. I then proceeded to speak to Matt from Pet Help Partners. Matt said although this isn't housing, this case could be fought and won in court. He said as long as she hasn't been hiding the dog everything will be ok. She said the building has cameras everywhere and she's been walking him outside the entire year before anything was said. Matt was given her information as well as reversed. Both of them will be in contact over the course of this court case.

Client came in to drop off a stray kitten. She came in with her 2 small children who was begging her to let them keep it. She said once we give the cats the shots, exam, and alter the kitten she'll take it home for the kids. I gave her information on the low cost vet mobile clinic and the ASPCA S/N van and told her she could get that done all by herself and that it's not 100% guaranteed that she'll get the kitten back. She said she will go get the kitten spayed on Thursday at the ASPCAMobile clinic and keep the kitten for her children. We exchanged contact information so follow up could be possible.

Customer came in wanting to surrender her 3 yr old cat name Jackie because she doesn't know what's wrong with her. Jackie stopped eating for a week and is shedding everywhere. Customer said she called everywhere for vets and everyone was so expensive and she on a fix income and can't afford the fees. I counseled her about ASPCA PIC and she was interested in calling them. She called and ASPCA was willing to give her a grant to a close by vet.

Program Details

Deferred Intakes

- Scheduling intakes for later dates in time when more resources are available or to allow for placement efforts to be made without needing the animal to be in our care
 - Animals are vaccinated, microchipped and processed before going back home for a period of time
 - Allows vaccines to take effect outside the shelter, thereby increase resistance to disease
 - Microchips may reduce animal abandonments and increase reunifications
 - Seeking placement while the animals are not at AC&C helps keep population density down, maximizing staff and resources ability to care for the animals that do come in
 - Partners and adopters receive animals that have spent minimal time in the shelters

Matching animals and partners who seek out those animals so they never enter AC&C at all

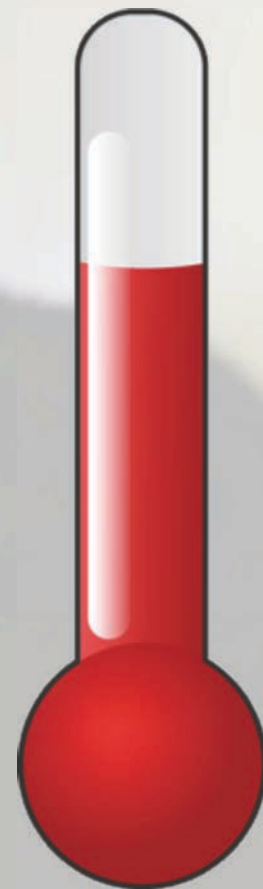

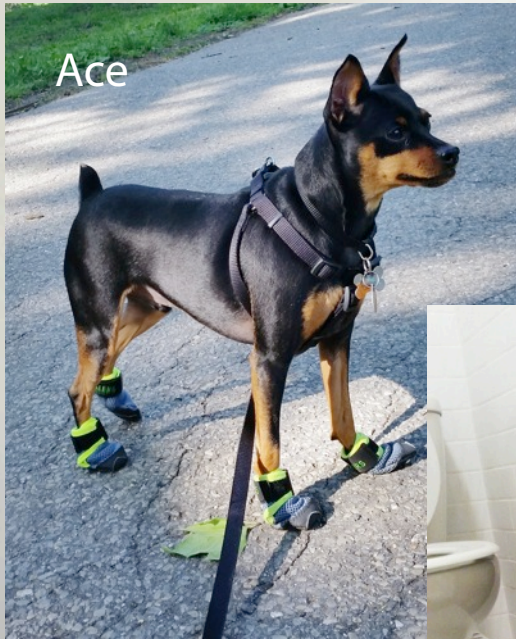

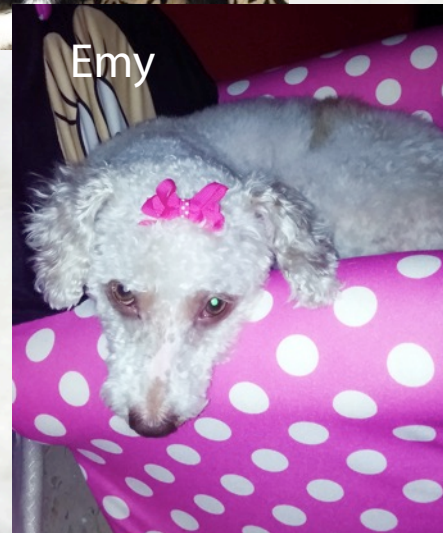

Cruelty



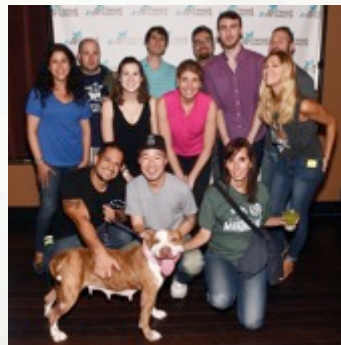

Identifying Disease Prevalence and Trends at AC&C

- Selected Diseases: Parvovirus, Panleukopenia, Kennel Cough, Ringworm
- Answers generated by using Care Center Data and Medical Data



Identifying Disease Prevalence and Trends at AC&C *continued*

- URI and KC decrease with improved cleaning protocols and timely vaccinations
- However, KC clinical presentation has oftentimes increased in severity:
 - a) Nature of in-shelter disease pathogens
 - b) Influenza, *Mycoplasma*, Respiratory Coronavirus, Respiratory Pneumovirus
 - c) *Bordetella*, Adenovirus-2, Parainfluenza, Distemper
 - d) KC in private sector (one pathogen) vs. KC in public shelter (multiple pathogens)
- Portraits of Canine Infectious Respiratory Disease (CIRD)
 - a) CIRD=> treatable
 - b) CIRD=> treatable=>unresponsive, switch antibiotic=>treatable
 - c) CIRD=>unresponsive to treatment attempts=>pneumonia (+/- hemorrhagic)

Canine Influenza Vaccine (CIV): significant addition to existing dog vaccination protocol

- DA2PP
- Rabies
- Bordetella
- CIV:
 - a) Initial vaccination at intake
 - b) Booster in 2 weeks
 - c) Killed vaccine: 6 months- 2 years estimated time to shelter-wide effectiveness
 - d) Natural history of CIV: 1965 to present (chimeric)

To Be Continued: *The Big Picture*

- Continued relationship with Operations to optimize animal health and comfort while in the shelter
- Continued emphasis on prompt initial evaluation, vaccines, and any necessary treatment
- Continuing to raise the bar for cleanliness standards and identification of contagion
- Combination of these efforts to reduce euthanasia

- Fact finding for the best approach to best serve our animals
- Strategizing for success:
 - a) Weekly meeting with AC&C Veterinarians: what we did right, what we could have done better, and what we did wrong.
 - b) Review new protocols and share new knowledge acquisition (from CE)
- Weekly meeting with Medical Supervisors (MACC and BACC) and Quality Assurance/Quality Control LVT (SIACC) to share in the discussion about forward progress.
- LVT QA/QC- new position with multiple functions to strengthen the LVT corps
- Walkthrough to identify any obvious medically-relevant issues

To Be Continued: *The Medical Director at Headquarters*

- Primary site for brainstorming with Senior Management
- Conducting monthly Morbidity & Mortality Conference
 - a) Advises Operations and Medical supervisory staff of key medical issues in the shelters
 - b) Reminds Operations of its important role in disease prevention and reinforces the mutually necessary overlap it shares with Medical
- Evaluate purchasing options to reduce the cost of necessary Medical inventory to maintain optimal levels of animal health and welfare in the shelters
- Thinking about program development
